

Description (Scope Note)

Asexual people of African descent born in the United States or asexual people born in African countries who live in or have a strong connection to the United States. Use for individuals who self-identity as African American. Follow the individual's preference for African American or Black whenever possible.

...sometimes an additional history note, and broader, narrow, and/or related terms.

History Note

To acknowledge their multiple marginalization, terms for people of color who are LGBTQ+ use the following format: Racial or ethnic identity followed by gender or sexual identity (e.g., Black lesbians).




- Terms for intersection of LGBTQ+ identity with other elements of a person's identity:

How to code terms from Homosaurus

- Use 650 (subject added entry: topical term)
- 1st indicator blank
- 2nd indicator 7 ("source indicated in [‡]2")
- *‡*2 homoit after the topical term
- 650 _7 Neopronouns ‡2 homoit

Do not use the 653 field, which is for uncontrolled terms. Homosaurus is a controlled vocabulary.


Eliminating terms now considered offensive, part 2



Homosaurus provides this definition:

"**Transsexual people**: Individuals who transition from female to male or male to female. Generally refers to individuals who transition their physical bodies to align with their gender identities. *Though this term was popular in the 20th century and is still in use today, it has been largely replaced by "transgender people" and "trans people." Some but not all people regard this term as outdated and offensive.* Only use to describe people who self-identify as transsexual."

Eliminating terms now considered offensive, part 3



So instead of Transsexual people, Homosaurus suggests **Transgender people**.


However, in the definition for that term, Homosaurus suggests looking for more specific terms:

"**Transgender people**: Broad term for people *who do not conform to their gender assigned at birth.* Add more specific terms when possible."

In this case, an appropriate narrower term exists: "**Trans women:** Women who were assigned male at birth."

Eliminating terms now considered offensive, part 4



The LC headings for this book also include the term Cross-dressing. The equivalent Homosaurus term is **Crossdressing** (no hyphen).

But...

Compare the definitions of these terms:

Transgender people: Broad term for people who do not conform to their gender assigned at birth.


And, **Trans women**: Women who were assigned male at birth.

Crossdressing: The practice of wearing clothing stereotypical to a gender other than the individual's predominantly-assigned gender.

And, **Crossdressers**: Individuals who were clothes stereotypical to or associated with a gender other than their predominantly-identified gender.

These are two distinct groups! Depending on the source, it may not be appropriate to use these headings simultaneously. You need the book in hand to decide.

Eliminating terms now considered offensive, part 5



Other Homosaurus terms relevant to this book:


Clothing: Items worn on the body for protection, insulation, and self-expression; typically made of fabric or textiles.

Gender affirming surgery: Any of various surgeries undertaken to affirm an individual's gender. Most often applied to transgender people, but may also refer to certain procedures undergone by cisgender and intersex people.

Birth certificate amendments: Formal changes to an individual's birth certificate, typically to reflect a change to the individual's legal name or gender or sex marker.

Broader term: LGBTQ+ personal and family law

As always, you would examine the source to see if these topics are given enough attention to warrant assigning a heading. In this intro, we're only identifying possible headings to use.
